

# MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT OF APUCEN

Engagement Network (APUCEN, as popularly known) was formed in 2011, it focused it's primarily effort on networking and increasing membership, as well as strengthening the foundation of APUCEN amongst its institutional members. To date, APUCEN now comprises of 84 members from 19 countries, expanding beyond Asia-Pacific regions with members coming from USA, Germany and South Africa, APUCEN has since opened its door to corporate members, with Toray Industries (Malaysia) Sdn. Bhd. being the first APUCEN Corporate Member. APUCEN is committed to expanding its universitycommunity engagement activities, besides fulfilling the Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) with its fellow corporate members.

From the end of last year to the first half of year 2016, APUCEN has kept its flag flying high and reaching out to both the local and international communities, working hand-in-hand with other APUCEN members on various community engagement projects, which are being showcased in this bulletin.

Among the successful projects was the APUCEN-San Pedro Rebuilding Community Programme in the Philippines, where APUCEN with several members managed to donate 10 units of permanent settlements to the victims of Typhoon Pablo in Andap. A resource centre was launched in Cambodia, with the joint effort of several institutions from Malaysia, where English resource books were donated which enable the students and local teachers in Cambodia to improve on the learning and teaching of English, Mathematics and religious studies. This is an exemplary project where community service learning approach had been implemented. Similar programme was also

conducted in Nepal, in commensurate with the first anniversary memorial of the devastating earthquake that claimed many lives there.

Meanwhile, International conferences on university-community engagement and ASEAN Women as well as a forum discussing Women Entrepreneurship have been conducted over the past six months. Capacity building workshops have successfully been introduced and implemented in relation to leadership training in community engagement, in addition to single mother entrepreneurship guidance. These workshops greatly enhance the development of the communities involved as well as strengthening the position and networking of APUCEN internationally.

I am happy to note that APUCEN@country is taking shape well where APUCEN@Japan had its first meeting in 17<sup>th</sup> February 2016 while other member countries will soon be having their country meetings. I would like to personally thank the past Chairperson of APUCEN@Malaysia, Prof. Dato Dr. See Ching Mey for her great contributions to APUCEN@Malaysia as well as APUCEN as a whole. At the same time, I would like to welcome Prof. Abdul Rahman Mohamed as the new Chairperson of APUCEN@Malaysia, and I believe Prof. Rahman will be able to bring APUCEN@Malaysia to greater heights.

In pursuit of its objectives, APUCEN has become empowered through networking with one another by opening doors and opportunities for making connections. We look forward to connecting with all its members! I certainly look forward to making many connections and working with all our stakeholders as we come together for a successful year.

niversiti Sains Malaysia (USM) together with fellow APUCEN members, namely Universiti Pendidikan Sultan Idris (UPSI), International Islamic University Malaysia (IIUM) and Universiti Malaya (UM) have been undertaking community engagement programme in Cambodia, by contributing educational books and improving English education at the school involved through the launching of the APUCEN Resource Centre.





Held on 31<sup>st</sup> March 2016, the benefiting school is UPSI School, Pray Bis Village, Kampung Chnang of Cambodia with a total enrolment of some 50 to 90 students. This project hopes to provide conducive environment for better education for the children and teenagers at the village. Through these English books contributions, APUCEN hopes to increase mastery in English among the Cambodian young generations so that they can read widely to gain knowledge and expand their mind globally.

Among the volunteered trainers are students from UPSI, UIA, and UM, who have been involved in guiding the Mathematics and English classes for a month, using advanced teaching technologies and religious approaches.





















# APUCEN IN ACTION TO SUPPORT SURVIVORS OF TYPHOON PABLO NANDAP, PHILIPPINES

2<sup>nd</sup> March 2016, APUCEN-USM graced the groundbreaking ceremony held at Andap, Philippines where 10 permanent shelters are being constructed, under the initiative of San Pedro College (SPC), in collaboration with Asia-Pacific University-Community Engagement Network (APUCEN) and Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM), through APUCEN have since provided assistance to the survivors of Typhoon Pablo, which hit Andap on 4th December 2012, through the effort initiated by fellow APUCEN member, San Pedro College (SPC).

The "APUCEN-SPC Rebuilding Community Program" was meant to heed the call of San Pedro College through its Disaster Risk Reduction Management and Research Program (SPC-DRRMRP). SPC-DRRMRP was the first to respond to the immediate needs of the victims in year 2012. USM through APUCEN is committed to providing optimum relief

and assistance of lighten the burden and sufferings of the victims and their families, and help them to rebuild their lives after the disastrous typhoon. This is in line with the USM's objective of sharing the available knowledge and expertise in global university-community engagement projects. The "APUCEN-SPC Rebuilding Community Program" was officially announced by Professor Dato' Dr. Omar Osman, the USM Vice-Chancellor cum the President of APUCEN during his keynote address at the University-Community Engagement Conference 2015, and also while chairing the 7th Regional APUCEN Council Meeting in Gold Coast, Australia on 3-4 November 2015, where he urged members of APUCEN to be actively involved in a global humanitarian relief effort. Despite the efforts of SPC-DRRMRP and few years have gone by since the tragedy, many victims still await fortheir new homes. With so many residents, who lost everything in the typhoon, expressing their desirous dream



of coming back to their livelihood, many residents remain homeless in Andap. The thoughts of long term sufferings among the victims and their families fueled our determination to lend them a helping hand to pull them up out of such miseries. Coming face to face with the people who have lost so much and yet filled with an optimism that they will heal from that loss; one does not need to make a second thought to do everything in their power to help. Members of APUCEN, especially Australia College of Psychology (ACAP), Griffith University, Kyoto University of Foreign Studies (KUFS), Universiti Utara Malaysia (UUM), San Pedro College and USM have collectively provided contributions to this program by allocating 10 permanent shelters to the residents of Andap. The ground breaking ceremony was also attended by the government officials from Office of the Governor of Compostela Valley Province, the municipal officials headed by Mayor Lorenzo L. Balbin, the Barangay officials, Rev. Fr. Edgar L. Tuling, parish priest of Mary Mediatrix of All Graces Foundation, and the community members who came to offer their heartfelt gratitude and words of encouragement, all for the good the people in need, as part of their social responsibilities.

All the APUCEN donors are indeed very happy to see that permanent shelters, which were sturdier compared to the tent shelters are being built for the residents. The feelings of joy could be felt atthe special ceremony tohonor the heartfelt assistance provided to the victims. There was an overwhelming spirit of gratitude and hope for everyone, especially the recipients who receivedthe gift of love at time of difficulties. Despite of the loss of their loved ones during the typhoon, life doesnot end there, for they can always fall back on the continual support of the community. This effort syncs with the basic aim of APUCEN, that istobe a platform for global university-community engagements andbe committed in our efforts to transform community beyond geographical boundaries, cultural and ancestral beliefs by bringing together the expertise and knowledge from its member institutions.





# INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON UNIVERSITY-COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT IN NEPAL

Besides the keynote presentations, there were 39 presentations focusing on University-Community Engagement: Integration, Innovation and Impacts and Instruction of Impacts and Impacts and

he International Conference on University-Community Engagement, postponed from the earlier scheduled date of April 2015, as the result of the devastating earthquake that struck Nepal a few days before the conference was held on 25-27<sup>th</sup> April 2016. It was organized by Nepal School of Social Work together with APUCEN, Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM) and Australian College of Applied Psychology (ACAP).

The 3-days conference attracted some 42 participants from 10 countries, namely India, Nepal and Pakistan, Thailand, Malaysia, Australia, Israel, South Africa, United Kingdom and Canada. Among the conference highlights include the presentations on university-community engagement projects and the problems faced and ways to overcome these problems or challenges. Among the notable speakers, who represent the various institutions and agencies

working on Community-Engagement were Professor Vimla V. Nadkarni, President of international Association of School of Social Works (IASSW), Mr. Syed Yusof Syed Kechik, Director of Community Collaboration, Universiti Sains Malaysia, Prof. Dr. Aileen Tan Shau-Hwai, Executive Director of APUCEN, Prof. Carolyn Noble, Inaugural Professor of Social Work at Australia College of Applied Psychology and Mr. Anil Chitrakar, Social Entrepreneur Ashoka Fellow. Besides the keynote presentations, there were 39 presentations focusing on University-Community Engagement: Integration, Innovation and Impacts and 4 student video presentations.

During the conference, the participants were taken to three community site visits (Nanglebare, Sakhu and disaster ruins), besides exposing to writing workshop and community café activity.



# INTERNATIONAL WORKSHOP FOR CAPACITY BUILDING

A total of 29 participants from institutions and 4 countries (Nepal, India, Canada and Malaysia) attended the training workshop.

international workshop entitled "Leadership Training Workshop in Community Engagement" was oragnised in Kathmandu, Nepal by Universiti Sains Malaysia and APUCEN on 23<sup>rd</sup> April 2016. A total of 29 participants from 11 institutions and 4 countries (Nepal, India, Canada and Malaysia) attended the training workshop. Supported by Master trainers from Universiti Sains Malaysia and training module for capacity building on community engagement, the module development project was funded by a grant from Higher Education Leadership (AKEPT), Ministry of Higher Education, Malaysia.

At the workshop, the participants actively participated in the open discussion sessions and willingly shared their experiences and knowledge. With the great success of the workshop, many of the participants have requested similar workshops to be conducted for their academics and staff at their respective institutions. It is heartening to note that APUCEN, together with USM, have made significant contribution in leadership capacity building on community engagement at such international level.

Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM) together with APUCEN member, MMICare Association recently carried out a community engagement programme by donating educational English books to two colleges, namely Bhagyodayo Ucha Madhyamik Vidhyalaya, Sakhu and Kadambari Memorial College of Science & Management, Budha Nagar in Kathmandu, Nepal.

Held in conjunction with the International Conference of University-Community Engagement in Nepal on 26<sup>th</sup> April 2016, the donation was handed over by APUCEN Executive Director, Prof. Dr. Aileen Tan Shau Hwai, who represented APUCEN President, Professor Dato' Dr. Omar Osman.

The conference attracted some 132 delegates from 15 countries, mainly senior academicians, including vice-chancellors and deputy vice-chancellors of universities in the region

ovember 2015 marked the successful hosting of the 4<sup>th</sup> Asia-Pacific University-Community Engagement Conference (UCEC2015) at Gold Coast, Australia. The biennially conference, was co-hosted by Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM) and fellow APUCEN member, the Australian College of Applied Psychology (ACAP). Held for the very first time outside of Asia, ACAP was largely responsible for the organization and planning of the conference, in consultation with staff from USM who provided ACAP with the necessary contact details of the APUCEN members and Malaysian Universities.

The Conference was chaired by Fiona O'Sullivan (Director Community Engagement), with the support of the team from ACAP and USM. The abstracts submitted were carefully considered and reviewed by a panel of senior academics from ACAP, USM and a representative from Griffith University. The panel was headed by Professor Chris Pratt as Academic Chair (ACAP). In total, there were 60 papers accepted for oral presentations, with another 8 posters for displayed. The authors

and presenters come from 15 countries: Over the 2-days conference, two keynote papers were presented along with a number of parallel sessions. The first keynote was presented by Professor Elias Mpofu from the University of Sydney who touched on "Community and civic engagement techniques in health sciences education". This was followed by Professor Dato' Dr Omar Osman, Vice-Chancellor of USM and President of APUCEN who presented a paper on "Driving innovative community engagement through knowledge transfer program".

Meanwhile, the wide ranging papers presented at the parallel sessions included, health, social work, community-based projects such as water supply to remote areas, education and training, the role of university-community engagement within indigenous communities and the role of university-community engagement in general. The conference attracted some 132 delegates from 15 countries, mainly senior academicians, including vice-chancellors and deputy vice-chancellors of universities in the region; which consolidating the importance attached to university-community engagement by many Asian governments.

# **ASEAN WOMEN (ICAW2016)**

This conference was organized by the Northern Corridor Research Centre, UUM and Asia-Pacific University-Community Engagement Network (APUCEN), as well as collaboration with vibrant citadels of learning, namely the Universiti Islam Bandung (UNISBA), Universiti Malaysia Sabah (UMS) and University College Sabah Foundation (UCSF), ICAW2016 justifies a the remarkable distinct of this event. The theme "Gender Mainstreaming and Public Policy" has been chosen when each policy has impact on the lives of both men and women's lives in one way of another.

With a sharing of over 50 paper presentations, four (4) institutional panelist's session and twelve (12) parallel sessions in 8 educational tracks which address the latest issues of gender mainstreaming and public policy, this conference managed to gather a total of 150 participants including those from Thailand, Indonesia, Brunei, Philippines, Nigeria and Malaysia. One resolution of ICAW2016 is the need to strengthen the commitment of all parties, in such inclusive and comprehensive manner by cooperating with the private sector in making gender a central consideration in the development and implementation of public policy towards advancing gender equality in ASEAN community.

MMICARE Association, a member of APUCEN, is one of the many NGOs in Malaysia that work with the vernacular and mainstream school systems. In Year 2011, MMICARE adopted a special programme involving the distribution of scientific calculators to selected students in Remove Class, Form 1 and Form 4 at the mainstream secondary schools. These calculators are usually distributed at the beginning of the school year.

In 2014, MMICARE adopted Standard 5 and post UPSR students from Tamil Schools into this programme, following a renewed interest in Mathematics, Science and English among vernacular school teachers. Aimed at enhancing their interests in Mathematics, MMICARE distributes scientific calculators and geometry sets. This Year 2016, MMICARE distributed 200 such calculators and geometry sets to some Tamil schools in Selangor, Johor, Penang and Negeri Sembilan.

The response to the project has been immensely successful, as quoted by the Headmaster of Sekolah Rendah Tamil Jalan Khalidi in Muar, Mr Pandurenggam: "This is the first time our students have received such valuable gifts and talks. Nobody thinks of giving the students calculators and geometry sets. This comes from people who understand the needs of the student."

This meaningful project was made possible by funds raised from a jogathon involving the 23 semifinalists of the 16<sup>th</sup> annual "Miss Malaysia Indian Global pageant". Each year, the semi-finalists of this beauty pageant are involved in a Community and Environment Awareness Programme, which are being facilitated by the School of Biological Sciences, Universiti Sains Malaysia. Funds raised are then channeled towards the MMICARE's Back-2-School programme and the Small Grant Education Awards involving postgraduate recipients coming from public universities. This year's project achived greater success with the support of APUCEN and Jabatan Perdana Menteri (SEDIC). As a preamble to the distribution of calculators and geometry sets, MMICARE organized a half-day workshops on "Less talked about issues" which cover personal health, puberty and social decorum.



# PROJECT "INSPIRE & UPGRADE"

The 18-20 March 2016 bootcamp was attended by 30 participants from as far as Johor in the South and Ipoh in the north. Project Inspire & Upgrade (I&U) is a "heart-2-heart" mentor programme.

PUCEN got off to a sweltering start during the height of the Equinox heat with the hosting of it's member MMICARE Association's "Project Inspire & Upgrade 2N/3D bootcamp" at a rubber estate resort in Kalumpang, near Tg Malim, Perak, Malaysia. Despite warnings of a heatwave due to the Equinox, MMICARE went ahead with its programme, armed with four big coolers, tents and bags of ice!

The 18-20 March 2016 bootcamp was attended by 30 participants from as far as Johor in the South and Ipoh in the north. Project Inspire & Upgrade (I&U) is a "heart-2-heart" mentor programme. Prior to embarking this programme to engage and support the camp participants, MMICARE member-facilitators were trained by Befrienders Kuala Lumpur and Federation of Reproductive Health Association Malaysia.

The bootcamp project focuses on young Indian women between 17 and 28 years, engaging them in positively seed minds and offer logical support and guidance amidst their social and cultural dogma. Among the topics tackled at the bootcamp were Women's Health (No Holds Barred), Body Image & Dress Sense, Social Media & Decorum, Resetting Goals, Good CVs & Interview Skills and Green Chat (Environment).

Professional Speakers present to share their expertises include well known gynaecologist Dr Premitha

Damodaran, PhD student, newscaster and former catwalk model Mrs Mohanaapriya Sina Raja, CyberSecurity Consultant Mr Krishna Rajagopal, LOA founder trainer Mrs Devi Thanabalan, Professor Zulfigar Yasin from the School of Biological Sciences, USM and Mrs Pushparani. Also at hand to drive home the girly-facts was 2016 Miss Malaysia Universe first runner-up and final year medical student Dhivya Dyana Suppiah. The bootcamp is the first of the five such camps scheduled to be held at Ulu Tiram, Sg Petani, Durian Tunggal and Mentakab to engage and empower Malaysian Indian girls on issues affecting their lives, including teen-romance, contraceptives, polygamy, sexual harassment, education and self-esteem. Of the participants, about 60% of them have completed their STPM examination and were awaiting for their university placements, 27% being undergraduates at UPSI or Polytechnic while 13% were 17-years'old students due to sit for their SPM exam or undergoing the MOE's skills training programme. About 85% of the participants' fathers were lorry, bus drivers and postmen. The camps, targeting the B40 group, are being supported by the Special Unit the Socio-Economic Development of the Indian Community (SEDIC) in the Prime Minister's Department, APUCEN, Befrienders KL, FRHAM, LOA and Gift Her With Life Fund.

Universitas Andalas dispatches some 4000 CSP students to villages in West Sumatra province for 45 days under the CSP programme

ommunity Service Programme (CSP) or Service Learning is an intra-curricular activity that combines the implementation of "Collegiate Tri Dharma (Tri Dharma Perguruan Tinggi)" with the methods of "Experiential learning and work with community empowerment among the students". CSP is a vehicle for the implementation and development of science and technology, to be conducted during off-campus at specific times, with different work mechanisms and specific requirements. CSP was constructed to foster linkages between the academic world and practitioners to ensure synergistic interaction, mutual acceptance and provision, mutual grindstones and compassion among students and the public.

Universitas Andalas, together with Universitas Gadjah Mada and Universitas Hasanuddin are the pioneer universities of CSP implementation in Indonesia. Since 1971, Universitas Andalas have carried out CSP by placing students in West Sumatran villages. The adopted learning programmes provided many benefits to the communities and created a unique learning process for students. Arising from this reality, the Rector of Universitas Andalas made CSP programmes compulsory in 1975, requiring intra - curricular activities to be taken by each student with a weightage of 4 semester credit units.

# Universitas Andalas's CSP implementation goals are to:

- provide experiential learning for students on the social aspect in the community and experiences in community development
- improve students' empathy and concern on existing societal problems
- develop students' soft skills
- apply knowledge and technology in life
- encourage and stimulate community development by motivating public to participate in development
- helping people and the government, in the form of providing energy, thoughts and ideas in implementing development programs to boost public confidence in the ability of
- to boost public confidence in the ability of Universitas Andalas students, to bring the community closer to the university





**Knowledge:** Students' possession of the knowledge, understanding and insight into the community;

**Skills:** Students' ability to identify problems, solve problems, make decisions, implement knowledge to conduct and evaluate;

**Value:** Students' ability to develop unity, honesty, equality and independence.

Every year during the semester holiday between semesters 6 and 7, Universitas Andalas dispatches some 4000 CSP students to 200 villages in West Sumatra province for 45 days under the CSP programme. At each village, 20 students from 15 faculties of Universitas Andalas are placed under one supervisor.

Before implementing CSP, students conducted surveys among the communities at pre-determined locations to discuss work programmes to be carried out. Universitas Andalas also equipped the students with useful information on customs and socioculture of the rural communities.

Activities carried out during the student service learning include:

the activities specified by the university,

students' initiated activities and

activities at the request of communities or local governments. Each of the student is required tot perform at least one activity relevant to the field of his/her study and on the average, every student to carry out 4 activities during the CSP.

APUCEN is looking into the possibility of encouraging all its members to implement Community Service Programme or Service Learning into their institutions curricular activities, where credit units will be given to the undergraduates. Universitas Andalas, being a member of APUCEN, will assist in spearheading this initiative.

a move to 'humanise technology', Universiti Malaysia Pahang (UMP) strategically mobilises its available talents and technology experts to deploy their technological knowhow and expertise for the benefits of the community at the grass root level. This is in line with the mission and vision of APUCEN where UMP has been a member since year 2010. With this in mind, innovations and research works carried out by the university have always encompasses human, academic and social factors. A simple, yet big impact innovation that could transform the life and socio-economy of the people would be far more meaningful.

UMP recently carried out a programme entitling 'Acheh Social Innovation Humanitarian Mission Project' to provide basic necessities, in the forms of water filters and solar lights to some 230 residents and orphans at the Dayah Nurul Huda Charity Home in Banda Acheh. Specifically, the programme was organised by UMP Women Association (Matahari), together with the Technology Engineering Faculty Student Association (Protech) and the undergraduates from Kuala Syiah University (Unsyiah).

Supported by 36 volunteers, the project helped to clean water ponds, paint and spruce up homes at its surrounding as well as conducting awareness and academic programmes. The project not only served as a mobility programme for the undergraduates but was also seen as an initiative that supported volunteerism agenda implemented by UMP, under its initiative called 'Community University'. It is an internationally-recognised social service work.

The project was spearheaded by Chief of Deputy Registrar (Research and Innovation) and Matahari Advisor Datin Fazia Ali. Also present was Matahari President Prof. Datin Dr. Mimi Sakinah Abdul Munaim. Matahari had received good cooperation from the Teuku Umar University Women Association or Darma wanita UTU.

The team has so far raised RM300,000 in funds to build and upgrade facilities at the hostel, to better accommodate the occupants whose numbers are growing. Currently, the facilities could only cater to 60 people. The charity home also received contributions

from Malaysia Islamic Economy Development Foundation (YaPEIM) for the construction of a residential unit for the teachers.

This project gave the participants, especially UMP undergraduates, the rare opportunity of sharing ideas with the UTU undergraduates, besides experiencing the perspectives of doing humanitarian work with an Acheh community. The university look forward to holding more meaningful programmes, including improving the water supply system for cooking and other facilities to cater to the increasing occupants.

UMP hopes that the university's research findings and technology-based innovations would serve as a good platform for sustainable development and to further enhance the socio-economic standing of the targeted communities.

Similarly, the same applies to the university's social innovation effort; a community charity drive involving the transfer of technology. It is being carried out through its Community-University programme, where the university moves closer to the local communities while the people stays more open to the university.

They have worked tremendously hard and I wanted to offer them my support in the best way I could.

It's a small price to pay to be able to raise so much to support this important cause," said Professor Ennew.

Among the recipients included the Handicapped and Mentally Disabled Children's Association of Selangor which received RM43,000 and RM33,000 in 2015 respectively, while World Vision Malaysia's Children Development Fund received RM36,000 in 2014.







#### Make A Difference

This resulted in the M.A.D (Make A Difference) Fund, where the University would provide financial support as students pitch their initiatives focussed on improving the well-being in the local, regional or global scope. To date, the fund has been used to help the Penans, an indigenous community in Sarawak to have access to education.

Also known as the UNMC Foundation, Yayasan UNMC aims to inspire students, staff, alumni and friends alike to contribute towards building a better society by helping disadvantaged communities. The foundation provides funds for the following key areas:



#### **Rebuilding Nepal**

About the same time when Nepal was devastated by the Gorkha earthquake in April 2015, a team of UNMC staff and students were actually attempting to scale the Himalayan peak, with the purpose of raising RM35,000 for two preschools in Long Itam and Long Kawi at the remote of Sarawak. Settling aside this original intention, rebuilding efforts for Nepal quickly became the University's top priority and Pioneer Foundation Nepal, a local NGO, was chosen to be the recipient of the RM22,900 raised.

The fund was primarily channelled to restore Shree Rameshwary Secondary School which serves over 700 families in the surrounding villages of the Gorkha region. Located at the epicentre of the earthquake, the school's classrooms, library, science and computer labs were destroyed, which affected some 350 students.

Looking ahead, UNMC will continue to emphasize more in service for the community, taking pride as a major civic force. The University look forward to more partnership programs with the government, business enterprises and education leaders in advancing its noble initiatives, creating new values and empowering its students and staff through charity and community engagements.













# **SMARTEX 2015** WHAT THEY HAVE LEARNED

The SMARTeX 2015 participants divided under two main categories. The first category involved 18 groups of student from USM. The second category contained various secondary school students (form 3 and 4) in Baling.

2015) is one of resiliency projects, implemented by SMART4U special interest group (USM), through fund provided by University Community Transformation Centre (UCTC) under National Blue Ocean Strategy (NBOS), Ministry of Education. This project mainly aimed at developing resiliency attitudes among the trainee teachers and secondary school students. It called for a two parted interview with the participants. The SMARTeX 2015 participants divided under two main categories. The first category involved 18 groups of student from USM. The second category contained various secondary school students (form 3 and 4) in Baling. The first part of interview was about the goals of each group. In general most of participant groups set their goals on the application and advantages of solar power to improve living environment. Their goals were: the preservation of nature, cost reduction, energy conservation, flexibility, multifunction, air reduction, and sound pollution.

Five groups of USM student goals were developing resiliency attributes such as teamwork, leadership, commitment, critical thinking, innovative mind, creativity, networking, self-awareness, self-reflection, self-acceptance, and adaptation to environment. The second part of interview schedule was about improvements or changes for they suggested. Three groups suggested a more conducive environment for SMARTeX 2015. For example, larger and more comfortable room with microphone, PA system and projector especially for showcase. Two groups wanted the project not to be limited to solar energy whereas, Three groups proposed to open the project for USM students from different classes.

Five groups from the secondary school participants were interviewed. They learned how to increase their resiliency and make solar racing cars. A video recording of this process was available. This allowed for recording the team tenacity to redesign and to



make a faster aerodynamic solar car along with collecting information, sharing ideas, teamwork and networking. Facilitators observed that students learned the concept of resiliency through this project. This project ignited interest in science for some students. These facilitators were prospective science teachers who would like to implement this project into their future teaching curriculum. They also found their roles as facilitators to be fruitful. They were also participants in SMARTeX 2013 and now they were teaching and sharing the concept of resiliency to new generation.

High school teachers found the project to nurture creativity and independent learning among the participants. They suggested a more complete assembly guide of the solar car, and commercialization of the solar car to make it available to the public.

The emergent of resiliency attitude was definitely reflected in this SMARTeX 2015. A better way to nurture the resiliency attitude through the experience of making solar car or solar product that are environment friendly. It is a sound investment for our future generation.


